Remembering Theo Meiners

On September 20, we lost an exceptional man and member of our community when Theo Meiners fell to his death in an accident in Anchorage, Alaska.

Although Theo's career as a ski instructor began in Colorado, we have claimed him as one of our own in Jackson Hole since 1978. In Jackson, Theo worked as an instructor, backcountry guide, and DECL. However, although he was an integral member of our community, it was understood by all of us that Theo's heart belonged to Alaska.

He had spent time in Alaska as a child, but it wasn't until the World Extreme Skiing Competitions, when Doug Coombs made tracks on the land-scape of the Chugach Mountains outside of Valdez, that Theo Meiners found his way home. Theo worked for Doug Coombs at Valdez-Heli Guides from 1996-2000. When the opportunity arose for him to start his own operation at Mile 45 on Thompson Pass, he seized on it with the full force of his passion, and began Alaska Rendezvous Heli-Guides.

In the short time since his death, there have been many articles published about the remarkable legacy that Theo Meiners leaves behind. When you read of him in Powder Magazine, Outer Local, and JH Underground, you will learn of a man of many accomplishments who filled his life with exceptional people and experiences.

Although these articles do a tremendous job of detailing Theo's biography, there is something they cannot fully convey about the hole he leaves behind. When we think about the tremendous loss that Theo's death brings, and all that we admire about him, there is one quality that must be conveyed – that above all Theo was a remarkable teacher.

Theo's talent as teacher came through in everything that he did. He was an individual of singular conviction. Intense and passionate; you could easily describe him as someone whose expectations of the people around him were only exceeded by his expectations of himself. But it was more than that – it was sincere belief. When Theo looked you in the eye and said "You've got this." whether you were looking into Corbet's, or listening to the pulse of helicopter pull away behind you – whatever it was that you faced – when he looked you in the eye and said those words, you knew not only that he meant it, but for one brief heady moment, he also made you believe it.

For those who found ourselves in the position of being his student, this quality of sincere belief made it particularly hard to shrink from any challenge that Theo presented you with. Especially when considering the stan-

Presidents Message

I hope everyone has been able to survive the warm dry summer. I am also hoping and praying for a good winter. Leaves are changing along with temperatures. Every year is a new beginning and I feel we're headed into some really good years.

Dustin and I attended the Strategic Education Plan conference in Denver along with representatives from other Divisions and disciplines June 23 and 24. There we worked on a Level 1 manual for all Divisions and disciplines. The group broke up into two sections. One group evaluated questions according to level and need and another to work on the text of the document. This document morphed from a Level 1 manual to more of an Entry level manual for people just getting into PSIA-AASI. The document can still be a good resource for resorts and their staffs. There is still work to be done on the workbook portion but the plan is to pilot it in 2012 – 2013 and implement for the 2013 – 2014 season. Information will be available on the website when we have more information come available.

Since June the Presidents have been meeting with Eric Sheckelton, Chairman of the Board for PSIA-AASI. We have been working on an Affiliation Agreement to come to a common understanding of what each entity brings to the member and each other. This has been a long slow process and is still an ongoing project. Many difficulties have arisen. Divisions like Western, Northern Intermountain, Northern Rocky Mountain and Alaska have moved to having the National office run their websites and offices. Since these Divisions do not have large membership numbers or budgets they have forgone running their own offices and chosen to have National do it for them. Other Divisions like Eastern, Rocky Mountain, Northwest and Intermountain still want their independence and ability to run their own offices. The goal coming out of the January meetings last year was to all work together towards a common Agreement. My concern is that if we turn to writing agreements from all 9 Divisions we will have 9 different ideas again without being consistent in our working relationship with the National office and the member. This, I feel, has been an ongoing process with PSIA-AASI. We are 10 different businesses but need to work more cohesively for the benefit of the member.

Eastern has called a meeting October 12 – 14 to discuss some of our common interests and needs for a working relationship with each other and National. I will be attending this event along with the Northwest and Rocky Mountain Divisions. These Divisions feel it would be important to come up with a few main objectives that we feel the National office needs to respond to this year. We are all in similar situations with the CRM4M system which is still not up and running as we were promised. There are still problems with the database, dues billing and operational aspects we rely on to service you our members. I thank our office staff of Susan, Lisa, Vicki, Phil, Kathy and Pam for working daily on tasks from the National office to work through glitches in the system.

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dard he upheld with his own fearlessness and passion. How do you tell someone like Theo that you simply don't have the courage?

This was another element in him that made him such a phenomenal teacher. It was implicit in these moments that he had pushed himself into the unknown many times. Like any great teacher, Theo was a lifelong student. He was a curious and driven individual. Theo died while attending the **International Snow Science Workshop** in Anchorage. Deeply engaged in the study of Avalanches, and committed to his chosen profession, he was always learning and adapting. He was hungry for knowledge and whatever he learned, he shared; with that came the confidence of a risk taker.

It is hard to accept his death. When the news came that in one sudden moment, he was gone – there was no being prepared. He was larger than life, as formidable as the mountains he cherished. Someone like that cannot disappear so suddenly.

In truth, it is an impossibility. Because Theo was such an inherent teacher, he is woven into the world he leaves behind. It is also for this reason that it is so hard to accept his passing. For him, the magic of the Rendezvous, and of skiing, derived from the joy of sharing it. Sure, his smile would always be big on a huge Powder day – but it would grow so much bigger the moment he caught sight of yours.

He ran the Rendezvous with the help of his son Aiden, a guide, and daughter Alexandra, manager of operations. He loved watching them come into their own and sharing that world with them. His pride was apparent. It was the same pride that extended, to a lesser extent, to anyone who had the privilege to learn from him. Clients were friends, the Rendezvous crew - family.

For all his accomplishments, he continued to have his eye on the future.

The International Paralympic Committee issued the following announcement May 2:

Para-Snowboard Included in Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games

The International Paralympic Committee (IPC) has announced that two medal events* in Para-Snowboard will be included in the Alpine Skiing programme at the Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games. This brings to 72 the number of medal events at the Sochi 2014 Games and is the first time that Para-Snowboard events have been included in the Paralympic programme.

Originally called Adaptive Snowboard, the sport is practiced worldwide by hundreds of athletes. Xavier Gonzalez, the IPC's Chief Executive Officer, said: "Snowboard is a fast paced and extremely exciting sport and we are delighted that it will form part of the Alpine Skiing programme at the Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games. I would like to thank Sochi 2014, NPC Russia, Russian Government, the World Snowboard Federation and the IPC Athletes' Council for all supporting the inclusion of these two extra medal events. It is important for the growth of the Winter Games that there are more sports and more medal events to contest. I am particularly looking forward to see how athletes perform in this exciting new discipline and believe it will prove extremely popular with spectators and TV viewers alike."

Dmitry Chernyshenko, President of the Sochi 2014 Organizing Committee, said: "Snowboarding is a young and exciting sport and one which is attracting new audiences and participants everywhere. Its inclusion in the Paralympics programme will give a further boost to the promotion of Paralympic

Alpine Certification

During the summer our division had the opportunity to participate in the PSIA Strategic Education Plan session in Denver. The goal of these sessions is to help the individual divisions to unify education and certification information. The result of this session was the creation of

a guide for new members going for Level I certification and the development of a national test bank of questions for Level I certification. As time goes on we expect this collaborative effort to develop more materials and processes that benefit our members. New this year, to the Intermountain Division, is the option for a 2-day Assessment for both the Level II and Level III certification processes. The 2-day assessment will consist of the same testing activities as the separate day format. Candidates choosing this path, instead the separate-day format, will sign-up and attend both days with their results delivered at the end of the second day. There will be a short feedback session with each candidate at the end of day one. The assessment groups, and examiners, will stay the same for both days. This will allow more opportunity for candidates to show their skill proficiencies to the same examiners.

The Level II assessment will follow the same general format as the separate assessment days. The skiing tasks will be performed on day one and the teaching activities will be performed on day two.

The Level III assessment option will split the current skiing and teaching activities between the two days. On the morning of day one the candidates will be performing five of the nine skiing tasks. Then the afternoon will consist of the assigned objective presentation, which will be based upon their skiing performance from the morning's tasks. At the end of the day there will be a brief feedback session for each candidate based upon their performance. The morning of the second day will start with the peer teaching segments. The peer teaching segments are based upon the candidates' observations of skier performance from day one. During the afternoon session the candidates will ski the remaining four of nine skiing tasks. Result will be delivered at the end of day two.

The 2-day assessment format has been designed create greater consistency for the candidates by working with the same group of participants and examiners for both days. This format also simplifies the certification process for prepared candidates.

an unprecedented level of exposure to the sport."

In February this year, Orcières 1850, France hosted a two day World Championships featuring 40 Para-Snowboarders from 10 countries. Gold in the men's standing class was taken by the USA's Evan Strong who finished ahead of New Zealand's Carl Murphy and fellow American Mike Shea. The women's gold was won by Bibian Mentel of the Netherlands, whilst silver and bronze went to USA's Amy Purdy and Italy's Sara Dorigatti respectively. February's event also included the sitting category for the first time, which is contested by riders with physical impairment such as paraplegia and bilateral lower extremity amputation.

The Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games will take place between 7-16 March 2014. Also included in the Alpine Skiing programme are Downhill, Super G, Super Combined, Giant Slalom and Slalom events. Nordic Skiing will see a number of Biathlon and Cross Country events contested whilst other medal events will take place in Ice Sledge Hockey and Wheelchair Curling.

The qualification criteria for the Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games will be published on Monday 28 May 2012.

Vancouver, Canada staged the last Paralympic Winter Games izn 2010. The event featured 502 athletes from 44 countries who contested 64 medals. Germany topped the medals table winning 13 golds.



- Eric Sheckleton and Bill Stanley reported on the affiliation agreement talks they have been a part of with the division presidents. They reported the progress has been slow, but they are trying to work through the agreements.
- Earl Saline reported on the National Demonstration Team tryouts and the progress on the strategic education plan.
- We voted and adopted the 2012 National Standards. They are now on our website and the national website.
- ◆ We discussed the national customer relationships management software system. This system has the capabilities of online sign ups, online dues payment, personal history and other member benefits. ASEA Executive Director Mark Dorsey introduced John Sarazen as the new information services manager. He was hired to get this system functioning better and to ingrate the web services to work with CRM in a more efficient way. John gave a presentation on how this would work and they are working on this now. There have been some vendor issues and the system is behind schedule, although they are testing new functions this October. Hopefully they will work in the new functions and they will be ready to go soon.

I asked Mark if this system would be compatible with a smart phone or a tablet and he said they would work and they have been testing the system with them.

The next national board meeting is scheduled in Copper Mountain October 25-28. The board will be updated on the progress of the CRM system and the affiliation agreement with the divisions.

The National Children's Task Force met several times during the summer to evaluate the current state of the Children's Specialist program. The NCTF agreed on

the following:

- To accommodate division operational differences, some minor language revisions were made to the CS National Standards;
- The CS program would benefit from having "universal" workbooks with a set of core questions for each event that could be used by all divisions. Division and discipline-specific questions could be added to supplement the "core" questions.
- Divisions will continue to issue certificates to participants to acknowledge the successful completion of the CS 1 and CS 2 programs. The certificates are recognized nationally.

As a result of these changes, *all* CS materials have been updated for the upcoming season – including the CS 1 and CS 2 Workbooks and the "Intermountain Division Addendum to the CS National Standards."

To conform with the updated Standards, only *current* (2012/13) materials will be accepted at our CS events this season. You can download the materials at www.psia-i.org.

In addition to our CS certificate programs and clinics, we're also offering several lectures geared towards increasing your knowledge base: "Developing a Team Approach in Planning Lessons for a Challenging Child" and "Anxiety Holding Back the Young Skier/Rider." For both lectures, the presenter is Granite School District Special Education Social Worker (and instructor) Eve Bier. Please refer to the online calendar for more details on these informative events - and for events in your area.

For your information:

- What do I do, if I already have an Accredited/Advanced Children's Educator (ACE) certificate? Your ACE now Children's Specialist 1 and 2 credentials are nationally recognized across all divisions. For those professionals that have their ACE 3 certificate, that certificate will still be recognized within Intermountain division.
- ◆ Do I need a new CS certificate, if I have an ACE certificate? No, your certificate is still valid.
- ◆ What do I do, if I have an international children's certificate/accreditation? Please contact the office for more details.
