

What Happens at Interski Does Not Stay at Interski

The messages that the PSIA/AASI National Team brought to Interski in Ushuaia, Argentina were a culmination of concepts that were created for the membership over the last several years. Some countries focus on content specifically for Interski. The USA delegation focuses on the membership needs and presents concepts that are currently being developed. One of the benefits of this is to make sure PSIA/AASI is staying relevant to the industry on the world stage also. There is also opportunity to get feedback from some of the best snowsports educators in the industry from around the world. That being said, our messages were well received by our international counterparts.



Student center teaching continues to be the hallmark of how we teach our guests in the United States. Since the 1970's the US has been creating different ways the student fits into the learning environment to give them a personalized experience that helps

their skiing and riding improve. This abundance of information available can oftentimes reduce the clarity in what we do. With that in mind, the PSIA/AASI Teams set out on a mission to help simplify decisions for instructors, simplify pathways for development and enhance our connection to guests in order to grow our sport.

A developmental framework was created to repackage this plethora of information into categorical triangles (see diagram). When asking the question "What attributes make up our most successful instructors?", it all lead to technical skills, teaching skills and people skills. Each group of these 3 skill sets helps create a simple place for

Education

Feeling Needy

What do you need? What do I need? What do I need to do to help get what you need?


I just became a dad for the first time. Before now, I have never spent anytime in charge of caring for a new-

born. I was uncertain if I had the skills needed to confront the great unknown staring me down.

Lucky for me her needs are predictable, limited, and communicated so clearly that it is surprisingly easy for me to understand. She gets hungry. She cries. She becomes tired. She sleeps. She is uncomfortable. She cries. She feels

lonely. She cries. These are all needs that I, or let's be honest, my wife (thanks to some key physiological differences) are capable of meeting. Every time we are able to fulfill her demand of the moment fills us with joy.

Compare this to a quick phone call to my brother and his 6-year-old boy. Apparently, this morning my nephew awoke in the pre-dawn hours deter-



mined to get some birthday cake for breakfast. In his not yet fully alert grogginess he walks smack into a closed door. The loud thud and ensuing cries wake mom and dad. The day's bad start gets worse as he tries to understand why cake for breakfast would be a problem for anyone.

Older children and adults rarely communicate their needs as clearly and predictably as my baby girl. If they did, we might think they were a bit ridiculous and immature.

As someone who observes things from an educational or development perspective, I can't help but admire and respect the directness of her communication. It is not yet obscured by more complex cognitive and emotional needs that inevitably become part of our daily lives as we age.

In the 1950s Dr. Benjamin Bloom introduced the CAP Model. It describes for us three distinct domains of human development and education: Cognitive (how we think), Affective (how we feel and socialize) and Psychomotor (how we move). Others have added depth to the CAP Model by adding hierarchies within each domain.

When training an athlete or ski instructor, I think the student's biggest challenge is that they, unlike my new baby girl don't know specifically what



they need. As a teacher my biggest challenge is that I may think I know what you need, but I don't REALLY know what you need. So, it seems pretty darn important to clue in to one's own needs and tell someone interested in helping something about those needs.

As you get primed to begin your favorite time of year have an earnest, honest conversation with yourself. Say, "Hello me. How's it going? Nice summer, eh! Are you ready for another winter? Do you have any goals? Any challenges on the horizon? What am I going to need to get it done?" Can you place your needs in the cognitive, affective or psychomotor domains? If yes, in which domain do you possess the greatest need? It probably seems like a simple thing or corny, but give it try. The simple power that this information could provide you may be the difference between surviving the season and thriving all season.

subset skills to be placed. This placement helps the instructor consciously access the skills needed for their students on demand. For example, when teaching kids, the teaching and people skills may be more important than focusing on technical skills. If it were a ski racer, technical skills may be the main focus. Although there can be a blend exhibited, the instructor can narrow down the focus depending on the student's needs.

A trainer may use this framework to lay out needs of instructors for training purposes. This will help keep individual instructors on a defined developmental pathway to fill skills gaps so the instructor is more successful. A school may emphasize specific parts of the framework to reach organizational goals. These skills can also be examined when looking to hire qualified applicants. At the hub of this framework is "The Student" If you replace this with the word "Trainer", "School", or even "PSIA/AASI" one can see the versatility of this model.

This developmental framework was presented at Interski along with specific examples from Adaptive, Alpine, Nordic and Snowboard Teams. The Team focused on Technical Skills during on snow and indoor presentations with a strong delivery of the "5 Fundamentals of Great Skiing". It was reported that all delegates from other countries agreed

that these fundamentals are in fact present in great skiing. World validation! Rolling up to Interski with the confidence to state specifically what makes up great skiing is good, but to have world validation of it is even better. Skiing was proven to be once again, one of the great unspoken languages.

Similar consistencies across nations were also found among the snowboarders. Although some statistics show that snowboard participation did not continue to decline like the previous two years, most all countries were still focused on retention and engagement. The Snowboard Team presented specific ways to improve people skills through a Personal Connection Model. Creating a strong connection between the instructor and the student will result in a greater experience for the student and even the instructor. Being able to connect with the student on a deeper level will allow for a customized experience that the teaching and technical skills can be applied to.

Some instructors do a great job connecting on a personal level without thinking or prompting. Others need guidance. Even though different countries have a variety of teaching methodologies, this also proved to be true of instructor characteristics throughout the world. The presentation of the Personal Connection Model allowed us all to reflect on retention by not just teaching skiing and snow-boarding to people, but more so teaching

people to ski and snowboard.

Whether the developmental framework is used for our instructors, trainers, directors, or PSIA/AASI it has become clear that it will serve as a powerful tool to organize the mass amount of information we all are collecting. Use this framework as a lens to see why other instructors around you are so successful. I will challenge you to evaluate your strengths and weaknesses within these skill sets to continue your professional development. Continue to fill in your own skills gaps for you, your school, and your students. - Eric Rolls is a snowboard national team member and has attended two Interski Congress events. Alpine Certification

As we enter fall and start to get ready for the winter season PSIA-I Certification events, there are some updates to the process that members need to be aware of.

The most exciting change to the assessment process this season is the removal of the requirement to take the

LII and LIII assessments in a specified order. This means members may take the online test, skiing, and teaching portions of the assessments in any order. When the last component is completed the candidate will receive their level of certification. This should make the process much easier to move through and make it simpler to implement for the division.

We are working on a new assessment format for LII and LIII certification with performance based coaching. This option will be for those candidates that want to gain more clarity of their performance during the assessment and an opportunity to make some changes. This is not a skill development clinic. The coaching will be only to change the performance of skills they already have. This will be a three-day event. The extra day of commitment is needed to allow for the coaching performance. Candidates that pass just the skiing or teaching segments will keep those results.

The office is moving ahead with technology updates that will make the event sign-up process more efficient and easier for everyone. Members will now be able to sign-up for assessments online, this is actually the best way to make sure you have a spot in your desired event. Each event has a designated number of allowed sign-ups based on the previous year's demand for the event. This will allow for a more efficient sign-up process. Space for events is available based number of staff and other factors. Signing up two weeks ahead does not guarantee a spot at the event. When some events are full you may be on a wait list while we work to expand the number of participants.

To help the member event sign-up process we have updated the DECL staffing process. We will now be using an automated staffing system. This system, similar to some of the ski schools in the division, will help the office implement the staffing numbers to meet member's needs. This means you should plan ahead and sign-up early for your desired events. The goal of these changes is to improve access and offer more clarity to those attending PSIA-I certification events.

Where is the Event Registration Page?

There is no form here! It's on the next page, but...

Starting with the 2015-2016 season on-line registration is available for all events, and yes that includes exams. This is an easy process.

- 1. Go to www.psia-i.org > events > event calendar
- 2. Locate the event that you would like to register for. Registration must be made 2 weeks prior to the event.
- 3. Click on the event and a pop-up will open. This page confirms the event, location and time. There is a Green bar that says "register on-line now" (not visible if event is scheduled in less than 2 weeks or is already full). Click this link.
- 4. You will need to enter your user name (email address that is on file with us) and your password. The password default is your membership number which can be found on your ID card.
- 5. Just follow the prompts from this point. You must agree to the liability waiver and have a credit card as a form of payment.
- 6. If you are unable to register for the event session it may be already full or within the 2 week window. In that case, if you wish to be on a wait list and or pay the late registration, see the following paragraph.
- 7. You will receive an email confirming your registration with date, time and meet up location.

 If you have problems we will be happy to help you, just contact the office at admin@psia-i.org_or 801-942-2066

Late Registrations and Wait List Options.

Registrations made within 14 days of the event will incur a \$20 late fee and must be on a manual registration form. Registrations will not be accepted, nor wait-listed participants added to any event within 7 days of an event.

Clinics and exam registrations close when the maximum number of participants have registered or at 2 weeks prior to the event. On-line registration will be unavailable. If you are sending in a registration form you will be notified upon receipt if the event is unavailable. No registrations will be accepted within 7 days of the event to better coordinate the host resorts requirements.

If the event is closed due to participation you may want to be "wait listed" for that event. Contact the office for the wait list process. It will require the manual registration form.

And starting in December the office will be open from 9:00 – 1:00 on Saturdays for Members' convenience.
